The Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) program warrants that kind of careful consideration. While it is a big-budget national entitlement program, it allows great flexibility to local decision-makers, and has made tremendous contributions throughout the great State of North Dakota. Rural communities are served by a State CDBG program administered by the ND Department of Commerce; the "Big Three" communities receive funds directly.


Bismarck's CDBG program has partnered with local organizations to impact many lives. CDBG funds have been used to improve housing and public facilities, provide operational support for local agencies, and increase accessibility throughout the City. Assisted activities have been as far-ranging as a dental clinic to serve low-income clients, a Backpack for Kids program to provide food for homeless children, and replacing a boiler at the Senior Center.


